


The Taylor Woodrow

The **Urban Heritage Award**, sponsored by MTR
Crossrail, was made to **Greater Anglia** for the
operator's work across a
number of stations within its
franchise, in particular for the
repair of the roundels and
other work completed at **Cambridge** station.



This year's **Contractors Award** was made to the **Stainmore Railway Co** for
the recreation of a steam era
water crane and tank at **Kirkby Stephen East** station.



The **Great Western**Railway Craft Skills
Award, recognising the
best use of traditional craft
skills in the restoration of a
building or structure, was
awarded to Mykanada Ltd
for the restoration of the
Northern Pavilion at the
Grade I listed Huddersfield
station and its careful reuse
as a public house.



The London
Underground
Operational
Enhancement Award

went to the Wensleydale
Railway Association Trust for
the sympathetic extension to
the existing platform at
Scruton station to make it
compatible with the
operation of preserved
railway services.



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The Supporters Award was given to Euston Tap Ltd for the work undertaken in reintroducing windows to the East and West Lodges at Euston station in London.




The Railway Heritage **Trust Conservation** Award for the best-restored structure supported by funding from the Trust was won by Network Rail for the restoration of Pantyffynnon station on the Central Wales line.

The Siemens Signalling Award was made to two of the country's leading preserved railways. The Bluebell Railway received its award for work undertaken in expanding the signalling capacity and restoration of the existing box and signalling at Horsted Keynes whilst the North Yorkshire Moors Railway was rewarded for the work completed on the signalling between Goathland and New Bridge.





The Volunteers Award was made to the Yarrows Heritage Trust for the restoration of Thrumster station on the long closed line between Wick and Lybster in northern Scotland.



The award for the best overall entry in this year's competition went to Network Rail Scotland for the dramatic changes achieved at Wemyss Bay in Scotland where an impressive partnership has seen the station restored to its original Caledonian Railway splendour.
